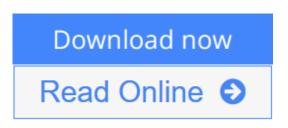


Phonics They Use: Words for Reading and Writing (6th Edition) (Making Words Series)

This edition includes three chapters on assessment, more suggestions for adapting activities for English language learners, and new phonics interventions for older struggling readers.

- A new chapters on Assessment and Differentiation of Early Reading Concepts (Chapter 5), Fluency Assessment and Interventions (Chapter 8), and Phonics Assessment, Coaching and Interventions (Chapter 13)
- More suggestions *For English Language Learners* show how teachers have adapted the *Phonics They Use* activities to meet the needs of their students who are learning English.
- Phonics interventions for older struggling readers focus on activities such as "Brand Name Phonics," "The Wheel," and "Mystery Word Match" to help older students learn basic phonics skills.
- Updated research, materials, and technology (Chapter 14) provides the latest findings on phonics and its impact on reading and writing.
